And what a service you will have rendered to the world in enabling her to do it, by furnishing her the means for this vacation in England! I have no doubt it has been worth a great deal to her to have the broad Atlantic between her & her worries on this side.

When you come back to Boston, I shall be delighted to

call & have you read
me her letters.

I hope you are
well & enjoying the
lovely scenery of
Shelburne. This place
is as lovely, in its
wild & oceanic way.

My strength does
not come back, but
neither do I seem to
retrograde. This winter
I expect to be in
town; so I shall be
able to run in and
see you oftener, if
you are willing; and

can hear the letters
from Mrs. Dargan
while they are fresh.

I asked Mrs.

Barrows whether she
wanted me to give you
her remembrances, and
she answered eagerly
and emphatically, "Oh,
yes, please do. She is one
of my very great ad-
mirers!" We all laughed,
for of course she
meant "admiration." She
and her husband (who
has since died) took a
great shine to you the

day you come out to our house.
