Mother dear,

My laundry came yesterday, and I was glad to get it, as I needed handkerchiefs badly. I have had a cold, but it is practically gone now. Thank you, too, for the cheese, which I have not opened yet, and the fig newtons, which are all gone. I shall send my laundry home as usual next week, and then there will be fresh things waiting for me when I get home. I shall have to bring my big trunk as it is all I have; I guess I shall be able to fill it, pretty well, for I have lots of things I want to bring home.

I went to Junior Play last night with Imogene DeWitt, an attractive junior from Dallas, Texas; the play was "The Road to Yesterday", quite a melodramatic piece, but interesting, well-acted, and good fun. Being a 30-point officer I was an invited guest, which was economical and delightful, as I went to the last, the Saturday night performance.

The minister at chapel was exceptionally good, a Mr. Fosdick of Montclair, N.J., and next week I shall cut out the summary of the sermon and save it for you. I spent part of yesterday afternoon writing a Parliament of Fools, the humorous page of the News, for one of the girls, so you will have to read that, too. I have been having the nicest time in Comp #10, for every week that we have had short themes due, which is pretty often, Miss Hart reads mine aloud to the class and praises it. It is getting to be a regular joke. The course is a splendid one, a study of criticism, based, just now, on reading from Plato, and parallel critics. If you would be interested in seeing them, I can bring my essays home.

I have just found out that the fare home is about \$28., which breaks my heart as well as my bank account. Be sure you send me some money to help out before I leave. I have several bills and fees to pay, so that it is absolutely necessary.

I have on the skirt you altered, and it looks too cute for words, but it makes me look quite fat. If I indulge in any clothes this Christmas, I had better get another dress like my grey one, for I simply live in that. I'm fast wearing it out, but it is practically all I have to wear to teas, open house at the societies, dinner, and, on Sundays. This building is too draughty for thin white dresses, although I have worn my white net some.

I shall send a copy of this weeks News with a picture of a corner of the big room at Tower Court; the fire place is at the right, between the two benches.

I want to do some work on an Art paper now, and anyway I've said all the most important things I can think of. Give the family my love, and tell Franklin I shall write to him soon. I wish Clara would tell me about the football game, who she went with, how she liked it, and what happened. Does she see very much of Jimmy?
